The Boy and the Gorilla Educator Guide

Questions For Discussion

- 1. Did the story make you think of a loss or death of someone in your life?
- 2. Do you know someone whose experienced death and sadness like the Boy?
- 3. The Boy has no name in the story. Why do you think that is?
- 4. What do the colors used in the illustrations at beginning, middle and end make you feel? Do the colors reflect the Boy's emotions?
- 5. Who do you think or what is the Gorilla? What might it symbolize?
- 6. Who do you think or what does the red bird symbolize?
- 7. At the beginning of the story notice the space between the Boy and his father. Why are they so far apart? Are they physically closer at the end? Why?
- 8. Why did the Boy think he'd find his mother at the top of the tree?
- 9. What did the Gorilla mean when he says to the Boy that his mother is always with him?
- 10. What activities or things reminded the Boy of his mother?
- 11. What activities do the Boy and his father do together in the end that help them think of the Boy's mother and allows them to grieve together?
- 12. Why do you think the gorilla and the red bird went away in the end?
- 13. Did this book remind you of another book you've read?

Personal Responses To The Book

- 1. The Boy likes to garden with his mother and fly kites with his father. Is there something you like to do with your mother or father?
- 2. The Boy tells the Gorilla his mother liked the waves at the beach. Is there a place you love to go?
- 3. The Boy liked Mom's pancakes and her special cookies. Do you have a favorite food that someone in your family makes?
- 4. The Gorilla tells the Boy that everyone needs quiet time. What do you do when you want to be alone?

Suggestions For Creative Writing

- 1. Try writing about someone you love that died or just moved far away. It could be a pet. Try to include memories like activities you did together, places you've been together or family events.
- 2. In the book there is one wordless spread where you see the Gorilla, Boy and his father hugging.

 Write a poem that could express what is happening and what they may be feeling.
- 3. For each of the Gorilla's quotations below, explain the meaning in your own words.
 - "Yes. We all do. But you have many more kites to fly."
 - "No one knows for sure."
 - "No. But she's always with you."
 - "That's all right. Everyone needs quiet time."
 - "Yes, each bite is like a memory."

Art Craft

- 1. Emotion Garden: Draw a garden of flowers that expresses the feelings the Boy has throughout the book. For example-for anger, one might draw a red, spiky flower.
- 2. Memory Box: Using a shoe box decorate it any way you like. Perhaps using construction paper, markers, stickers and photographs. Fill the box with things that remind you of someone you love. For example- the Boy might put a baseball, seashell or cookie recipe in his box which are filled with memories of his mother.
