Get into the ACT! Reader's Theatre--An immersive and interactive story experience!

So what is Reader's Theatre?

In Reader's Theater, students "perform" by reading scripts created from grade-level books or stories -- generally without benefit of costumes and props. The goal is to enhance reading skill and confidence through practice with a purpose.

The wonderful thing about Readers Theatre is whether you're a <u>creator on a</u> <u>school visit</u> or <u>a teacher in a classroom</u>, your students can have an immersive, interactive and FUN story experience by creating a Readers Theatre.

How?

- Picture Books make for a **perfect theatrical experience**. Stories have characters, dialogue and setting.
- And to me the **strongest benefit of Readers Theatre** is how it may enhance a student's level of comprehension. **Reader's Theatre appeals to different learning styles—visual, auditory and kinesthetic.** This applies, especially, to students who have difficulty sitting still or focusing. Students get to **act** the characters in the story. That process includes movement and acting the emotions of the characters.

• In the end, Readers Theatre may offer a deeper and lasting effect in understanding the story.

Everyone can participate:

- Writers: Students can write the play by using the story and dialogue for inspiration.
- No memorization of lines is required. Along with casting the lead roles, one can also have a Greek chorus, so that all the students have speaking roles.
- Sound effects: students can create sounds like wind/rain, animal sounds, planes/trains, clapping/knocking or footsteps.
- Not needed, but one could create simple costumes: handheld masks or props.
- Make a movie by filming it using any smart device. It's fun for students to see their production.

Master teacher Susan Finney shares these characteristics of "Reader's Theater" activities:

- Students do not memorize their parts; they always read from their scripts.
- A stage is unnecessary, student simply stand or sit in a semicircle.
- The script is treated like a new story, in that instructional support may be needed for new vocabulary and understanding of characters.
- Give the readers opportunities for practice.
